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What is a Values Based Education?

In each newsletter, we share our value of the month with you.

All members of our school community were involved in selecting the values for Knaphill School. Our values drive everything we think and do.

A Values Based Education (VbE) empowers our school to underpin its life and curriculum with positive human values, such as: respect, integrity, kindness and equality.

VbE provides a teaching environment in which learners experience those positive universal values first hand throughout their schooling.

An effective VbE environment has three core foundations:

- All adults model the positive universal values that the school community itself has chosen.
- The values are developed into an ethical vocabulary which empowers learners and staff to articulate basic and ethical concepts.
- The school creates time and space for children to develop reflective practices so their values experiences can be processed into a living guide to self-and interpersonal awareness.

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Encouraging Your Children to Develop Fundamental Reading Skills

At our school, we highly value reading and know that your child will make the best progress if we work together. Here are some ways you can help:

- Ensure that your child brings their reading book and reading diary to school every day.
- Record your child's reading progress in the reading diary and make a note of any challenging words in the space provided.
- For Lime level readers and below, keep an eye out for our new reading bookmarks.
 These are designed to help you ask questions that will boost your child's reading ability and help them move on to the next level.

BLUE

Prompts/questions for parents

- Can you use your phonics to sound out then blend the word?
- Can you sound out new words in your head before you read them out aloud?
- What do you think might happen next?
- Did that word make sense there? Why? (If incorrect word used.)
- What adjectives would you use to describe the character/setting?
- How was the character feeling? Why? How can you tell?
- Retell the story in your own words.
- Is this a fiction or a nonfiction book? How do you know?

TURQUOISE

Prompts/questions for parents

- Can you sound out and blend new words in your head before you read them aloud?
- > Can you work out the word by reading to the end of the sentence or looking at the pictures?
- What do you need to do when you see a full stop, exclamation mark, question mark, comma or speech marks?
- Can you read what this character says in a different voice?



- Tell me what has happened in your own words.
- Why did that happen? (throughout reading)
- Has that happened to you? What choice would you make?
- What do you think will happen next? Why?
- How do you think the character feels? Why? How can you tell?



Would you recommend this book to a friend? Why?

Prompts/questions for parents

- Read the blurb on the back of the book. What do you think could happen? Why?
- What persuaded you to choose this book? Have you read anything by this author before?
- What information do you learn about the character from what they are doing / how they are acting? Remember, actions give clues about feelings.
- What do you learn about the character from what the other characters are saying or doing?
- Why has the author used____? (e.g. brackets, bold type, italics).
- Can you tell me what the author means by that word / phrase / sentence?
- Can you find a word in the text which describes the setting or character? Do you know any words with similar meanings?
- Can you summarise the main points/ events in the text?
- Can you explain why the text is structured in this way? How does this affect how you read the text?

Pupils can bring their books from Monday 11th December and hand them to their class teacher. Our Reading Ambassadors will organise them for the swap to be held on the last day of term. Set in Sri Lanka, this debut novel follows Chaya, who has a habit of stealing to help those in need, but taking the queen's jewels and the royal elephant means that she's now a target and needs to escape into the jungle. Nursery, but when they are put in two different classes and PS finds a new friend in Turner, the school bully, Nate's world turns upside-down. As he struggles to make sense of this and forge new friendships, he's dealt another blow when his youngest brother, Dylan is rushed into hospital.

His new teacher, Mr Joshua, sees a spark inside of Nate that's lit by his love of reading and writing and shows him how to use this to process what's going on. But with so much working against him, and anger rising inside him, will this be enough? A powerful and lyrical story about finding your place in the world and the people that matter within it.
