Last week, Mrs Bowry shared one of her favourite books in our weekly reading assembly.

Mrs Bowry recommends 'You're a Bad Man, Mr. Gum'.
This is the first book in the Mr Gum series of books by Andy Stanton. Mr Gum is an extremely nasty man who hates everyone and lives in a disgusting tip of a house.
His garden, though, is immaculate and beautiful. And this is because if he lets it get out of control, an angry fairy who lives in his bathtub comes and whacks him over the head with a frying pan.
So when Jake the dog, a bouncy, friendly animal beloved of the whole town, decides that this garden is the perfect place to play in, Mr Gum isn't best pleased!

This story, the first in a series, is utterly surreal, completely daft and extremely funny.

How do you convince your friends that the moon is not made of cheese? Be the first to venture into space and prove it of course! Armstrong is a captivating and compelling work of beauty. It centres around a determined little mouse who is eager to discover the secrets of the universe and to become the first creature to step onto the surface of the moon.

This is a book that has appeal on so many levels: it's a gorgeous picture book with exquisite illustrations, perfect for sharing; it has bags of potential for linking to a unit in school about space travel and it shouts out loud the importance of aspiration, imagination, perseverance and resilience.

New boy George is super clever and plays a mean game of football, but when his ear falls off in a lesson, his fellow pupils start to get suspicious. It doesn't help when George comes for tea at Daniel's house and his 'handlers' advise he can only eat a sliver of dry bread and some oil. It's clear there's something odd about George... but Daniel, Maxie and Louise - and Daniel's cat - have started to really like him.

This is a story that will make readers think about what it is to be human, about how to live life to the fullest, and about the importance of love. Marta Altes' fine illustration style is full of emotion - you'll find yourself poring over her drawings again and again. Whilst this is a funny and easy to read book, it's also sad and rather profound in places, ending on a beautiful

When orphans Bonnie and Sylvia fall into the hands of evil Miss Slighcarp, they need all their wits - and the help of Simon the goose-boy - to escape unscathed, for the governess is more cruel and merciless than the wolves that surround the great house of Willoughby Chase. Filled with brilliantly-drawn Dickensian characters, it would make an excellent choice for strong preteen readers who like an old-fashioned story with a strong plot and good characterisation. This book often appears on lists of best-loved children's books.

## Chapter book

Set in Victorian times, this is the story of the children who worked on the dangerous job of building the famous Forth Bridge.

This is a truly exciting adventure that brings a real historical scenario to life. The thought of being perched up on top of the bridge with no safety measures at all made my blood run cold! Add into that some villainous villains and a child hero and you have a recipe for breath-taking episodes and action-packed escapades, with a seamless blending of fact and fiction.

The book is quite a slim one and very easy to read. The shorter length makes it very attractive to children who want to read more complex material but have less stamina and are put off by lengthy books.
The story will also appeal to budding engineers, with fascinating insights into the construction of one of the UK's most iconic bridges.
