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WhatsApp - What a parent should know!

This is not the first time we have included information about WhatsApp in our newsletter. However, we are concerned about the number of parents who have given their children access to this app without fully understanding the risks involved:

- WhatsApp is for users 16 years and over. If your child has access to WhatsApp their date of birth has been falsified.
- WhatsApp has a group chat feature the person who sets up the group can let anyone join that group at anytime.
- Class WhatsApp groups that your child maybe in are not endorsed, encouraged or monitored by the school.
- Young users risk exposure to cyberbullying., inappropriate content and contact with strangers
- Your child can delete a message sent in error. Other members in the group can screenshot and share deleting may be too late.
- NSPCC report that many young users have been encouraged to overshare information within groups, which they have later regretted.
- Many young people find their mental health suffers, as they feel pressured by the amount of notifications. They are spending a long time checking their phones as they don't want to miss out.
- By default, WhatsApp sets the privacy settings to allow: Any user to see your child's profile photo, read receipts and when they're online. Any users can add your child to groups without permission. It is up to the user to set necessary privacy settings - HAS YOUR CHILD DONE THIS?

Einstein the Penguin - Iona Rangeley

Chapter book

When Mrs Stewart invites a small penguin to visit on a spontaneous visit to London Zoo, no one could have imagined that later that day they would find him on their doorstep, rucksack on his back and an adventure about to begin… Einstein the Penguin is the debut children's novel for Iona Rangeley, aptly brought to life with the help of the award-winning illustrator, David Tazzyman. A lovely mix of whodunnit with a slightly preposterous story of a penguin who comes to live with our two heroes, Imogen (age 9) and Arthur (age 6), causing them to put aside their sibling squabbles and come to his rescue. Rangeley manages to pull at your heartstrings as you come to understand each of the characters' insecurities, bringing together the fear of losing a friend with the loneliness associated with never having had one. The grown-ups are scatty at best and young readers will love it as our heroes come to put one over on them.

> <u>Year 4</u> <u>Erica's Elephant - Sylvia Bishop</u> Chapter book

When Erica Perkins wakes up on the morning of her tenth birthday, the last thing she expects is to find a very confused elephant sitting on her doorstep. So begins an unlikely friendship. But can a small girl and a rather large elephant learn to live together in a tiny terraced house? And when the dastardly owner of the local zoo plots to steal the elephant, will Erica be able to outsmart him? Illustrated with heartwarming and engaging line drawings. Sylvia's writing has a wonderfully classic feel while the offbeat humour makes it contemporary and fresh.

Runaway Robot - Frank Cottrell Boyce & Steven Lenton Chapter book

A funny, inventive tale told in first person by Alfie Miles, a Year 7 boy who discovers a one-legged robot in an airport's lost property. Alfie's right hand was amputated in

an accident and he has been given a state-of-the-art prosthetic hand, but he is struggling to accept the new limb and he has the feeling he's forgotten something really important. A fast-paced adventure, inspired by a real-life robot. Steve Lenton's illustrations are excellent

and it is great to see Alfie and his friends positively depicted with their limb differences.



<u>Year 6</u> Can you Feel the Noise - Stewart Foster

<u>Chapter book</u>

A profound story about inner strength and perseverance in the face of a life-changing event, from the award-winning author of The Bubble Boy. Perfect for fans of R. J. Palacio's Wonder and Lisa Thompson's The Goldfish Boy. Life is going well for Sophie. She's getting by at school, has some pretty awesome friends, and their band have made it through to the semifinals of the Battle of the Bands competition. But when Sophie wakes up completely deaf one morning, the life she once knew seems like a distant memory. With lessons replaced by endless hospital appointments, and conversations now an exercise in lip-reading, Sophie grows quieter and quieter. Until she discovers the vibrations of sound through an old set of drums and wonders whether life onstage is actually still within reach. Drawing on the author's own hearing impairment, Can You Feel the Noise? is a deeply personal and moving story that will stay with you long after reading.
