Attendance Cup


The winners of the attendance cup this week are Birch class again - with an unbeatable 100%


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
Uniform Matters

Wearing smart school uniform helps your child feel part of our Knaphill School community. It fosters a sense of belonging and helps build relationships. Uniform promotes a sense of equality and reduces anxiety as pupils clearly know what the expectations are.

We would like to remind pupils, parents and guardians of the uniform expectations.

Don't forget the Knaphill Schools PTA regularly run second hand uniform sales.





Please ensure all shoulder-length hair is tied up.
Earrings: only small studs and these must be removed on all PE days.

Tights and socks should be black, grey or white. Pupils should opt to wear tights or socks but not both.

Base layer leggings should not be worn with shorts as an alternative to long trousers, but may be worn with green PE shorts on PE days.





Jewellery including earrings must be removed for PE. We ask your child doesn't wear earrings on the days they have PE. Teachers are not permitted to assist your child in removing earrings.





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Reminder - Hair Styles

Hair

If longer than collar length, hair should be fully tied back with a suitable neutral band or head band (or ones in the dark green school colour). Children should not have hairstyles fitting the following description:

- · Lines shaved into the hair
- · Patterns shaved into the hair
- Hairstyles which are considered extreme. This includes hairstyles where the sides are much shorter than the top, Mohican/mohawks, tramlines, cuts shorter than a grade 3, hair colour or the use of excessive hair gel

Thursday 7th March - World Book Day


Pupils will be taking take in World Book Day themed activities.



Year 3/4 The Day my Dog Got Famous By Jan Carney

Stitch Head - The Graphic Novel

Stitch Head, the curious, almost human creation of Professor Erasmus, has been captivating readers for over a decade. His quirky, features are near enough to human to be more charming than scary. Stitch Head's fate is to remain in the background as his master the eccentric Professor Erasmus creates increasingly dangerous characters to inhabit the spooky Castle Grotteskew. He feels forgotten and abandoned. But then Stitch Head meets someone who want to make him a star. It's a scary step but it means Stitch Head has the chance to change his life. What will Stitch Head do? In this graphic novel version of the original, Guy Bass's story is given a brilliant new interpretation through Pete Williamson's witty and dramatic illustrations.





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Year 5
The Swifts
By Beth Lincoln

Young Shenanigan Swift is presented with a murder mystery to solve in her own (rather grand) house and surrounded by all members of her large and decidedly eccentric extended family. Who caused Arch-Aunt Schadenfreude to fall down the stairs at the regular Swift family reunion? Is it linked to the family's periodic search for Vile Swift's missing treasure trove? With so many suspects and so many hiding places, Shenanigan needs all the help she can get, even if that means turning to her sisters, science-obsessed Phenomena and goody-goody Felicity. As country house murder mysteries go, this is top notch, with a fabulous cast of characters and perfectly placed red herrings. It's also extremely funny, full of jokes, situation comedy and gloriously idiosyncratic narration. If you're wondering why Shenanigan and her family have such unusual names, it was decided in the 'tights-and-doublets' days of the Swift family, to name children using the Family Dictionary; after all, 'People often overlook a Mary or a John, but they seldom forget a person named Meretricious or Flinch.' In a sub-plot, Shenanigan puzzles over whether her name found her, or if she is somehow choosing to grow into her name. Clever, original and hugely enjoyable, this is a don't miss.

Year 6 On Silver Tides Sylvia Bishop

Kelda has always protected her little sister Isla from danger on the rivers, and from the suspicions of their community. For Isla cannot breathe underwater – and so her very existence is forbidden by silvermen's Lore. Now the rivers of England are growing sick: monstrous creatures are awakening and a fierce torrent of blame falls upon Kelda's family. When betrayal comes, the sisters escape on a desperate journey upstream. Joining forces with a mysterious boy, Kelda discovers the darkest depths of her kind's secret history. But to save both her sister and the very life of Britain's waterways, Kelda will have to make a sacrifice – one that will change her life forever.
