As we enter into the holy month of Ramadan, which commences on 10th March this year, you will have received an email with our updated fasting policy attached.

For your information, the aim of this policy is:

- To provide a safe environment for children who wish to fast during part or all of the month of Ramadan.

- To ensure that the proper care of children is maintained and to keep parents informed if their child is unwell.

- To further develop understanding and respect of the different faiths represented in our school community.

Please note - All parents must inform the school in writing (by email is acceptable) if they wish their child to fast during part or all of the month of Ramadan.

We understand that fasting is not compulsory in Islam before the age of puberty, we understand that some children are often encouraged to fast, or indeed wish to fast, in order to prepare them for adulthood.

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Promoting Good Attendance

Good attendance is a high priority with the Leadership Team at Knaphill Federation of Schools. We believe it is essential that children attend school regularly if they are to achieve their potential. Absence not only affect a child's attainment but also their personal and social skills. We will do all we can to encourage parents/ guardians to ensure that the children in their care achieve maximum possible attendance and that any problems that prevent this are identified and acted on promptly. Leave of absence can only be granted in exceptional circumstances and a request form must be completed.

Safeguarding is at the heart of our school and is incorporated in all we do as a school and children's attendance is something that we monitor closely as part of this. We have thorough procedures that we follow when pupils transfer between schools and if a pupil moved to another school without warning or went 'missing from education'.

In order for the school's Attendance Policy to be successful, every member of staff will make attendance a high priority and convey this to the pupils at all times. We ask parents/guardians to support these views in the home to ensure that children are receiving consistent messages about the value of education.

> Year 3 The Mellons Build a House - Robin Jacobs

The Mellons need to build a forever home that is lean, clean and green! The Mellon family have outgrown their flat. It's time to move, but none of the houses they look at are quite right, so they decide to build their own house. Masha is an architect. She designs a house that accommodates the Mellons' needs, their budget, and most importantly, the environment. It is an eco-house.

The Mellons Build a House is a hugely enjoyable picture book that takes the reader step-by-step through house design and build. Heat pumps, solar panels, insulation and rainwater harvesting are all clearly explained and brought to life in Nik Neves's warm, inclusive illustrations. A timely and essential read for aspiring young architects and construction-enthusiasts.Year 3

Year 4 - Joan Proctor, Dragon Doctor - Patricia Valdez

Back in the days of long skirts and afternoon teas, young Joan Procter entertained the most unusual party guests: slithery and scaly ones, who turned over teacups and crawled past the crumpets... While other girls played with dolls, Joan preferred the company of reptiles. She carried her favourite lizard with her everywhere – she even brought a crocodile to school! When Joan grew older, she became the Curator of Reptiles at the Natural History Museum. She went on to design the Reptile House at the London Zoo, including a home for the rumoured-tobe-vicious komodo dragons. There, just like when she was a little girl, Joan hosted children's tea parties – with her komodo dragon as the guest of honour. With a lively text and vibrant illustrations, scientist and writer Patricia Valdez and illustrator Felicita Sala bring to life Joan Procter's inspiring story of passion and determination.

What's so special about animal skeletons? Find out in BONES, an inside look at the animal kingdom.

How are animals able to bite, run, jump and fly? What special adaptions have they developed over time? Bones takes the reader on a fascinating journey through the biological history of the animal kingdom, with sections focusing on different animal abilities - biting, flying, jaws, tails, and more - explaining how their amazing bodies allow them to do so many different things.

Human 2.0 - Patrick Kane and Samuel Rodriguez

Imagine being able to hear for the first time, or see in full-colour, or take your first steps on Earth. This incredible book celebrates the remarkable achievements made in medical engineering, and offers a glimpse of what the future might hold for humanity. Pioneering technological breakthroughs have truly changed lives. For some people, particularly those with disabilities, recent advances have crossed the realms of the purely imaginable, and reached a place of possibility. People with paraplegia can walk again, those who are hearing impaired can listen to even the faintest sounds, and some people with missing limbs can create beautiful works of art. This phenomenal book is a celebration of all that has been achieved so far, and a look at what might be possible in the near future. Is it inevitable that technology will surpass biology? From cochlear implants and pacemakers, to bionic arms and legs, this empowering book also features spotlights on pioneers including Paralympians Richard Whitehead and Blake Leeper, and the world's first 'cyborg' Neil Harbisson
