PERSONAL DEVELOPMENT AT KNAPHILL SCHOOL



Alongside other pupils from 17 local schools, we were treated to a talk from inspiration speaker - Chris Lubbe.

He introduced us to his life as Nelson Mandela's bodyguard and the difficulties growing up during apartheid. Having grown up in a ghetto in Durban, South Africa,

Chris witnessed first hand the brutality of apartheid.

Through powerful stories of his own life experience Chris spoke to us about fear, courage, determination, love and forgiveness, all in the face of racial discrimination.

It was an amazing opportunity and experience for the children.

Some of his impactful messages:

Forgiveness liberates the soul; it's like the key to freedom.

An eye for an eye will make the world go blind.

The truth hurts but silence kills.

Words have value - they are like toothpaste. Once squeezed out, you can't put them



KNAPHILL SCHOOL TO GET HUGE INVESTMENT TO IMPROVE GREEN SPACE





In 2023, our PTA undertook a parent survey to ask how the community would like the PTA to focus funding efforts to address green issues. 81% of respondents wanted to see the PTA do more to improve green spaces /the natural environment within our schools. As a result of this, the PTA focused their efforts to look at what could be done and worked with Mrs Harrison to come up with a vision to turn the grey spaces at the junior school green.

This week the PTA received news that they had been successful in their funding bid and will receive a grant of over £40,000 to landscape the large and small playgrounds in the junior school with green screens/living walls.



This is a huge investment for school our and the installation green of screening all around our playground will improve the air quality for our children, provide a more natural learning environment and create a beautiful green space in Knaphill. We are so excited to see the vision become a reality!

In March, Mrs Harrison, PTA Vice Chair, Vikki Zeila and Councillor Hassan Akberali met with Councillor Saj Hussain to share our vision for improving our school environment and he agreed to give his support to the project.

He worked closely with Vikki to approve the funding for the whole programme via Surrey County Council. We are thankful that Councillor Hussain believes in our school and is providing our PTA with continued support to enhance the learning environment for our children.
