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Year 6 - Art


Year Six have been studying the artist, William Morris.

Using his style and influence and inspired by the Arts and Crafts Movement of the Victorian Era, they created their own handmade 'wallpaper'. This involved using ratio to colour mix paint to specific shades and using materials to create unique wooden print blocks. I'm sure you will agree their final products were a success.



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Yesterday, in our assembly children learnt what it means for us to live in a democracy and how this differs from living in a dictatorship. This assembly was mainly led by some of our Knaphill Prefects, who read two short scripts to the other children. In one was a situation where a group of people had no right to have their ideas heard and in the another, whilst not all people agreed, everyone could have their voices heard and share what they thought. The rest of the school listened beautifully and many children shared their understanding of the value of freedom to share what they think, and to be heard.







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Attendance Policy

At the end of last term a copy of our new Attendance Policy was emailed to all parents. It came into effect on Monday 19th August 2024.

Our Attendance Policy has been amended to include the new procedures, as directed by the Department for Education (DfE).

Please note that the changes are listed below. Please read very carefully:

If you take your child/ren out of school without authority for 5 or more days (which do not have to be consecutive), then the following will apply:

- 1. If you have not incurred a penalty notice relating to this child/children in a rolling 3 year period since 19 August 2024, then the penalty notice will be charged at the rate of £160.00, per parent/carer per child, if paid within 28 days. This will be reduced to £80.00 if paid within 21 days of receipt of the notice. Failure to pay the Penalty Notice will result in Surrey County Council considering legal proceedings against you in the Magistrates Court.
- 2. If you have incurred a penalty notice relating to this child/children since 19 August 2024, the rolling 3 year period will be activated from the date of the first penalty notice and the second penalty notice will be charged at the flat rate of £160.00, per parent/carer per child, if paid within 28 days. There will be no reduction for payment within 21 days. Failure to pay the Penalty Notice will result in Surrey County Council considering legal proceedings against you in the Magistrates Court.
- 3. If you have incurred 2 penalty notices relating to this child/children in the rolling 3 year period since the first penalty notice was issued, then you will NOT receive a third penalty notice Surrey County Council will have no option but to consider a prosecution, per parent/carer per child, in the Magistrates Court under s 444 Education Act 1996.




Governor News

What do we do?

In a nutshell - to help the school provide the best possible education for your children. We support and encourage all aspects of school by acting as a "critical friend" whereby we will challenge and ask important and difficult questions as well as being supportive.

School Governors also have a number of important legal responsibilities, including health and safety of staff and pupils in school, ensure delivery of the National Curriculum and oversee the school's budget.

We take a forward-looking overview of the school and agree its vision, values, strategic aims and its policies. We monitor and evaluate the school's performance and ensure the school is accountable to everyone it serves eg children, parents, staff and local community.

What have we been doing?

Previously School visits have been carried out to monitor Phonics, Maths, SEND and Safeguarding Future visits are planned this term to look at Health & Safety and Premises, Curriculum PHSE and Geography and SEND.

More recently all Governors have updated their Safeguarding Training. Within the wider school community, we have been liaising with the PTA and looking at further development of Eco Projects. I had the pleasure of attending the very successful Macmillan Coffee morning and had a lovely time talking with pupils, parents and grandparents and I know we are looking forward to the Laser Light Show in December.


Anya's Quest

But a half-forgotten song links the two children, and its words summon the mighty goddess Ganga, who takes the pair on an epic journey through time and space in a chariot drawn by the river dragon Makarato, to reconnect with their spirit animals and to heal the natural world.

This is a beautiful tale about human connections with nature, inspired by Hindu mythology. The gods and deities are intricately described, and they shine brightly in Jane Ray's magical illustrations, which dazzle throughout the book.








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YEAR 5 - Portal of Chaos


This magically illustrated gamebook plunges you into a story with a difference - one where the hero is YOU.

No, the universe needs a hero - and like it or not, that hero is you!

On school photo day, when it really matters that he looks his best, Andrew manages to upset a bully, get involved in a disastrous science experiment, and have a nasty encounter with a fast-moving basketball. Until, with glasses smashed, ruined clothes, and a face full of blood, he looks anything but his

By the time it's his turn with the photographer, he's exhausted. And the nugget of worry that was in his stomach at the start of the day has grown into a massive, flaming boulder of anxiety that could explode at any moment. As well as expressing the compulsions and intrusive thoughts that are part of living with OCD in a way that makes it easier to understand and empathise with, Andrew's story also tackles other complexities of family life such as dementia and multi-generational living.

Using humour to make serious issues accessible and palatable, the book is peppered with spot art and comic panels, which depict the reality of extreme anxiety with honesty and wit.

- Signposting to appropriate services for support, advice, and intervention.
- · How to collaborate effectively with educational settings.
