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Keeping Children Safe

Smart watches are becoming increasingly popular with young people. Companies have now started producing affordable, simplified versions aimed at primary age children. These have have features such as step counters, which are great for encouraging children to remain active. You can even set the display so it shows an analogue clock face - brilliant for teaching children to tell the time. However they leave your child vulnerable to unwanted phone calls, cyber-stalking and distraction while crossing the road.

Some of these watches can be connected to internet, take photos and receive messages. We understand that some of these watches allow the camera to be disabled, however staff can not easily tell if this is the case.

For the same reasons we don't allow children to keep mobile phones with them during the day, we would like to remind parents that smart watches are not permitted in school.

ENABLE FAMILY SHARING

Apple Watches aren't cheap, but they do offer superb safety features – allowing parents to control calls, messages and emails on the device, as well as a location tracking system that can send alerts if kids wander beyond pre-set boundaries. 

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Artist of the Term

Anni Albers is this term's artist of the term. She was a weaver and she chose to weave because back then in Germany - where she came from - if you were a girl there were only a few subjects you could choose from.

She was born on 12 June 1899, Berlin, Germany and she sadly passed away at the age of 94 on the date of 9 May 1994.

So our school has been replicating her work. Year 6 even made their own looms out of cardboard and string, to make some fantastic artwork with wool. Year 5 used a variety of materials including ribbon and strips of plastic bin bags.

The bin bags put a few people off but the end result was phenomenal.

Year 4 also used wool but with ready made paper looms.

And year 3 created brilliant art with raffia.



Anni Albers lived a good 94 years of her life, being born in June 1899 and passing away in May 1994, with only just a month to go before her birthday, which would have made her 95. Her art is still very famous around the world, especially in Germany because she was born there. That is where her art journey started. Then she moved to America and began to create more art, which was photographed and likely shared with artists around the world, leading to her becoming

famous!

Anni Albers got into weaving when she was only young as there weren't a lot of options for girls to do back then. The options she had were cooking, art, or weaving, and she continued weaving until she was quite old. Anni Albers created many pieces of famous artwork that went on to be displayed in different museums.

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Attendance Policy

We are taking this further opportunity to share our Attendance Policy with you that came in to effect on Monday 19th August 2024. As you will be aware, our Attendance Policy was amended to include the new procedures, as directed by the Department for Education (DfE) and can be found on our school website.

Please note that the main changes are listed below:

If you take your child/ren out of school without authority for 5 or more days (which do not have to be consecutive), then the following will apply:

1. If you have not incurred a penalty notice relating to this child/children in a rolling 3 year period since 19 August 2024, then the penalty notice will be charged at the rate of £160.00, per parent/carer per child, if paid within 28 days. This will be reduced to £80.00 if paid within 21 days of receipt of the notice. Failure to pay the Penalty Notice will result in Surrey County Council considering legal proceedings against you in the Magistrates Court.

2. If you have incurred a penalty notice relating to this child/children since 19 August 2024, the rolling 3 year period will be activated from the date of the first penalty notice and the second penalty notice will be charged at the flat rate of £160.00, per parent/carer per child, if paid within 28 days. There will be no reduction for payment within 21 days. Failure to pay the Penalty Notice will result in Surrey County Council considering legal proceedings against you in the Magistrates Court.

3. If you have incurred 2 penalty notices relating to this child/children in the rolling 3 year period since the first penalty notice was issued, then you will NOT receive a third penalty notice - Surrey County Council will have no option but to consider a prosecution, per parent/carer per child, in the Magistrates Court under s 444 Education Act 1996.

Any leave of absence for absences from Monday 19th August 2024, will follow the new procedures.

In line with the new DfE guidance, we are now obligated to request medical evidence and flight/ holiday confirmation when an illness occurs just prior or after a holiday request.

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


<u>Year 3</u> Squirrel and Duck: Mission Improbable By Tom Percival

When she discovers that her theatre home is in peril, Charley decides to escape, and make a dangerous journey along the coast in order to get back to - and save - all that she loves.



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


YEAR 5 - The Hunt for the Golden Scarab M.G. Leonard
